

Caring for Mothers

When families, communities and governments nurture mothers, children thrive and we all benefit. (We recognize and advocate for nurturing of all primary caregivers, including fathers, grandparents and others.)

Nurturing is powerful and drastically undervalued. Nurturing heals, promotes empathy, and counters violence. In order to nurture their children, parents themselves must be nurtured.

Recently, the Economic Security Project presented a webinar about guaranteed income programs for mothers: giving mothers cash and trusting them to know how best to spend it for their families. It was great to see many passionate, creative leaders from communities across the

country driving change that will benefit us all. Society saves money in the long term when children thrive. And putting cash directly into mothers' hands is a powerfully healing act. The <u>Magnolia Mother's Trust</u> explains that a pillar of their work is "the belief that all people deserve to be the authors of their own lives, and one's destiny should not be determined by their race, gender, or class." See their website, where they are sharing mothers' stories, helping to change cultural attitudes and eventually, policies.

A new member of <u>Family and Home Community</u>, Gabrielle Ravioli, attended the webinar and commented to the presenters and participants: "When we encounter skeptics of guaranteed income programs, we need to be careful of not immediately citing cases where mothers are still working (though this is often the case), But we miss the mark when we focus on work, which is what capitalism values. We need to value the time and connection of being together with our children." Several of the mothers who participated in guaranteed income programs spoke about how they were able to spend more time with their children, how much they valued this time and saw their children benefit. This valuing of time together is at the core of <u>Family and Home</u>
Network's mission.

There is also a written report: <u>Cash as Care</u>. We'd love to know what you think.

Alongside our allies at the Global Women's Strike and as members of the ABC Coalition, we've been advocating for an extensions of the Child Tax Credit (CTC), which is essentially a guaranteed income. Although there is abundant evidence of the benefits of the CTC, no one knows whether Congress will manage to send a bill to the President's desk.

Reframing Motherhood as a Gift



On the topic of mother-child time together, we were very happy to find J.Taylor Calderone's eloquent op-ed. She pushes back on the many articles that focus on the burdens of motherhood, especially during the pandemic:

"But as we try (rightly) to acknowledge the difficulties mothers face, especially as this pandemic unrelentingly continues and the youngest children remain ineligible for vaccines, there is a larger narrative taking shape before our eyes: childcare, and motherhood, is a hindrance to women everywhere. We are standing on a precipice, and we are about to declare motherhood inconvenient."




The Power of Parents
